There are at least four rival ways to pronounce Latin. The pronunciations in Classical Latin differ from those in Ecclesiastical Latin, which differ from those used in science. Just as there are several dialects of the English language, regional variations in Latin have existed. Because of the ever-changing nature of language, we're taking the advice of a seasoned Latin instructor: "Just choose a pronunciation and stick with it."

This pronunciation guide is based primarily upon the Roman System, which can be found in the Appendix of Henle Latin under "Pronunciation."

Classical Pronunciation Guide for Declensions

Vowels & Diphthongs	Pronunciation
b,d,f,h,k,l,m,n,p,qu,r, t,x	as in English
s	/s/ as in sit (not z as in rose)
ā	/ä/ as in father
a	/ə/ as in idea
ē	/ey/ as in obey
e	/ě/ as in net
ī	/ē/ as in gasoline
i	/i/ as in pit
ō	/ō/ as in note
o	/ö/ as in off
ū	/ōō/ as in ruler
u	/oo/ as in foot
ae	/ī/ as in fly



Cue: My pet platypus slid on 2 webbed feet down the snowy hill.
